
- 4 8. PROBLEMS ARISING IN PRINTING
- a) If you use the RS-232 port, check the baud rates.
- b) If there is a failure when copying the screen but it functions well with LLIST and LPRINT, check the type of software being used and the possible configurations, POKing at address 64524.
- c) Omission or errors in character printing. Check the BUSY line for the CENTRONICS port and the DTR line or the baud rate for the RS-232.
- d) The soffware for the SEIKOSHA GP100 assumes that the printer carries out line-jumping when the carriage is returned. When listing a program, if the lines overprint, consult your printer manual since there will be switch with which you can select.
- e) The input routine uses a double "buffering" to reduce the loss of input characters, but if the tempering of the external equipment is not the same as that of the interface, you may recive useless characters. If this happens, use the following BASIC line to cancel these characters:

100 LET a\$ = INKEY\$#3: IF a\$ =" " THEN GO TO 100

### 5. CONNECTIONS OF BOTH PORTS.

## CENTRONICS CONNECTOR



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This possibility facilitates communication at a character to character lever and is more flexible than the use of INPUT # 3.

Examples:

10 LET a\$ = INKEYS # 3

20 IF CODE a\$ > = 32 THEN PRINT a\$:

30 LPRINT a\$: REM (output echo, equivalent to PRINT # 3)

40 GO TO 10

This will not stop when the Spectrum screen is full and the "SCROLL?" message appears.

### 4.6. INTERFACE CONTROLLING ROUTINES

The interface uses 2 main routines in machine code for inputs/outputs and can be used directly from BASIC.

a) OUTPUT. Type the following line:

POKE 64525, byte: RAND USR 64761

where "byte" is the character code to be sent. The port to be used, and the series or parallel are determined as in section 3.3.

b) Series INPUT.

RAND USR 64698. LET a\$ = CHRS PEEK 64525

If this method is used with the interface, you do not need to activate the software as described under point 3.

### 4.7. USE OF THE INTERFACE IN MACHINE CODE

It is assumed that all users wishing to use the interface in this way will have a wide knowledge of machine code; therefore this section only includes reference information. For example, to transmit at 300 bauds you must do the following:

POKE 64520,83

POKE 64521.4

Although the above figures give speeds within the EIA standards, on some Spectrum models slight adjustment will be necessary and this should be done in steps of 1, choosing the value which does not give any character errors.

### 3.3. PRINTING FORMAT OPTIONS

## a) Automatic line-jumping option.

If your printer does not require a line-jump character (10 or 0AH) after the carriage return (113 or 0DH), the software can be changed in order to avoid the line-jump being sent.

Type the following line:

FOR a=64928 TO 64932 POKE a, 0: NEXT a

In order to activate this option, type the following lines:

9980 FOR a= 64928 TO 64932: READ n: POKE a, n=NEXT

9990 DATA 205, 253, 252, 14, 10

## b) Tokens

The BASIC programs are stored as simple characters instead of all the letters (see Spectrum manual, Appendix A). In order to produce a program listing, these Tokens should be extended until the complete key words are obtained.

If sending a program from one Spectrum to another for storing an subsequent execution, these Tokens

### 4.2 I PRINT

This command is simular to PRINT (see Chapter 21) but with the following differences:

- a) It will not recognise LPRINT AT.
- TAB functions normally but does not return the carriage to a new line after 32 characters.

NOTE. The characters which can be defined by the user, the graphic blocks and other characteres which are nor ASCII characters, should be LLISTed or LPRINTEd as "?" or left blank, and the only way to get a copy on paper of them is to use the facilities of the SCREEN COPY if your printer is suitable for this.

Example

10 LPRINT CHRS 14, "DOUBLE PRINTING" 20 LPRINT CHRS 15, "NORMAL WIDTH"

### 4.3. PRINT

The interface can be used with alredy existing programs which use the command PRINT without modification. However, PRINT AT will not be recognised.

When the program which uses PRINT commands is loaded onto the memory, and the software controlling the interface is activate, type:

OPEN # 2, "p"

and begin the program using GOTO n instead of RUN.

To return to the usual mode, type: CLOSE # 2.

# 4.4. PRINTING OF GRAPHICS

There are two options: a "normal" output and an "extended" output in which each point is represented by 4

The above connections are given only as examples; since in practice there are many possible variations, the appropriate manual should be checked. The functions of the signals are as follows:

- Data transmission: interface series output to peripheral.
- b. Request for sending (RTSI)/data terminal ready (DTR), informs Spectrum that the peripheral is ready to accept data.
- c. Data reception: series input from peripheral to interface.
- Ready for sending (CTS): output to peripheral indication that the Spectrum is ready for reception.
- e. Mass: pin 7 of the type-D connector (signal ground) can be connected to pin 1 (Protective ground).

### NOTE:

DTE is for the data terminal equipment.

DCE is for the data communication equipment.

# SPECTRUM CENTRONICS AND RS 232 INTERFACE

## 1. INTRODUCTION

This interface which is easily connected into the Spectrum expansion port provides two communication methods: parallel Centronics and the bidirectional RS 232-C series.

The two communication methods can be connected simultenously to two different pieces of equipment, such as a printer and a MODEM

The software necessary for operation is written on EPROM and is placed at the high addresses of the ZX Spectrum memory (this interface is only valid for the 48K Spectrum), using the Spectrum initiallisation when connecting it to the power supply.

The interface is controlled by means of the standard BASIC commands and some USR routines.

## 2. INTERFACE CONNECTION. CHARACTERISTICS

To connect the interface, first disconnected the Spectrum from power supply. Connect the interface into the back of the Spectrum. Since the Spectrum connector is extended behind this interface, it is possible to connect other peripherals, as long as the same input/output addresses are not used.

The wire for the Centronics connector is simply plugged in following the guides on the interface connector.

This software operation should always be done after giving a RUN or NEW command.

The interface has a switch on the upper part for selecting 2 types of software to cover a wide range of printers.

If the switch is at position 2, before connecting the power supply, suitable software for printers such as the NEC, EPSON, NEW PRINT, C-ITOH, LOGITEC, etc. must be mode available . If it is at position 1, the software is suitable for the SEIKOSHA GP-100.

# 3.1. CENTRONICS

If your printer has a Centronics input, you can use the BASIC LPRINT and LLIST commands as described in the Spectrum manual and load the programs you wish for listing.

If you wish to make a copy of the screen at high resolution, remember the following:

- For NEC and C-ITOH printers, the interface will provide the graphics without modifications.
- For EPSON, NEW PRINT (ADMATE) and LOGITEC printers, you should first carry the following instruction: POKF 64524.4

since the graphics are handled in a different way.

- For other printers which work graphically with an 8-point matrix, they probably work in the same way as one of the above.

For the SEIKOSHA GP 100 printer, you should use completely different software but it is placed on the Spectrum if, when the power supply is connected, you had alredy put the switch at position 2.

The interface uses two output ports.

251 (FB H) for Centronics output data.

127 (7F H) for output of control signals and transmission of data througt the RS-232 port.

And one input port:

251 (FB H) for information about the state of the printer and data reception through the RS-232 port.

Since only one decoding line is used, the addresses with A2 or A7 at zero should not be used

To use the RS 232 output, you must make your own cable following the diagram in **Appendix B**.

The cable will have a standard DIN 5-pin connector at one end and D-type 25-pin connector at the order. The connections vary from one appliance to another. There are some examples in Appendix B.

Ensure that the possible options of the printer are correct and finally connect the power supply of the Spectrum.

### 3. OPERATION, POSSIBLE MODIFICATIONS

To supply power to the interface via that supplied to the Spectrum, the necessary software is placed for interface functioning. The software in machine code is automatically protected by the RAMTOP.

In orden that the interface is operated by the software, the following command should be given:

**RAND USR 64973** 

so that come of the system variables change making the interface easily controllable from BASIC.

3.2 RS-232 CONFIGURATION

The RS 232 input is always active but the output is interchangeable with the Centronics output. To switch from one to the other is done by "POKING" the appropriate value is indicated below:

The software included in the interface implies a rate of 2400 bauds and a data format as follows:

DATA bits
PARITY bits 1
START bits 1
STOP bits2

The baud rate can be selected by POKing the following values at certain memory addresses:

NOTE: Incorrect connections can cause permanent damage to the interface, to the Spectrum and, in some cases, to the peripheral connected to the interfaces for this reason, check your network carefully.

Ensure that pin 5 of the DIN connector (TX DATA) is connected to pin 3 (RX DATA) of the standard D-type 25-pin connector of the printer. Also, pin 3 of the DIN connector should generally be connected to number 20 of this D-type connector for the RS-232. As this can vary, consult the printer manual.

For this option, the software provides another place in the memory (64519). In order to prevent the expan-sion of the Tokens, type:

POKE 64519.1: RAND USR 64973

To return to normal, use.

POKE 64519.0: RAND USR 64973

This possibility can be used to send blocks of characters to some printers. Also note that the RS 232 port transmits 8 data bits but only 7 can be used to avoid problems with the parity bits sent by some equipment. This means that the "tokenised" programs should be transmitted in a hexadecimal format or a similar format to ensure the exact reconstruction of the memory data.

### 4. USE FROM BASIC AND IN MACHINE CODE

The program in machine code which controls the interface is stored about the RAMTOP so that it is protected by RUN and NEW. If by accident you were to execute one of these 2 commands, you would only have to renew the system variables (activate it) with the command:

RAND USR 64973

4.1 . ILIST or ILIST n

When the program to be listed is loaded with LLIST, you list the complete BASIC program.

With LLIST n, where n is a natural number between 1 and 9999, you will list the program from line n to the end.

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dots to give a figure which is double the "normal" height and width. The precision of the representation is determined by the printer which can mean that regular shapes are reproduced with slight disfiguring. Anything that can be printed or traced on the screen can be printed using this facility with suitable printers.

a) NORMAL

When the image to be copied has been obtained on the screen, type:

RAND USR 65044.

This produces on paper an image which has a width of  $32 \times 8 = 256$  dots.

b) DOUBLE WIDTH

Proceed as under a) but type:

**RAND USR 65047** 

This will produce on paper, if the printer allows, a width of  $32 \times 14 = 512$  dots.

If this does not fit, the last columns will be missing.

Graphics printing is somewhat slow but it is worth the wait. The COPY commands included in a program which you wish to adapt to this interface should be substituted by the corresponding USR command.

4.5. RS 232 INPUT FUNCTIONS

- a) The following points are important and should be remembered
- The input will only respond correctly to equipment which uses the indicated order of protocol. When this is not possible, it will be necessary to insert a pause between each charater sent form the external equipment.

 Altough it is possible to work with 4800 bauds, if any problems arise we recommend working with 2400 bauds

- III) The software is written with the Spectrum as the control equipment. This means it will control a printer or a VDU but is cannot be controlled by a VDU.
- IV) The line jump characters are normally taken by the Spectrum INKEY\$ function as a STOP character and they report "STOP IN INPUT". For this reason and beacuse much equipment sends automatic line jump codes, they are selected and ignored by the interface. The "STOP IN INPUT" report can also be produced when an ESCAPE character is received (decimal 27 or 18 hex.).
- b) INPUT # 3.

The interface software uses channel 3 (the printer channel) for input and output. The use of PRINT#3 there-fore substitutes the use of INPUT from the keyboard.

Examples:

10 INPUT # 3 "ONE CHAIN"; a\$
20 INPUT # 3 "AND ONE NUMBER"; a

The rules for the INPUT are applied as described in the Spectrum manual.

### c) INKEYS #

Their use is similar to that of INKEYS except that the control is not returned to the user until a character is received (see also 4.7.)

# Examples:

10 LET a\$ = INKEYS # 3 20 IF CODE a\$ > = 32 THEN PRINT a\$: GOTO 10
